OXALIC ACID SAFARIS

Neighbourhood Group Support

We encourage all members to practice integrated pest management for the control of varroa in your hives. Late December or early January is the ideal time to use the "OA trickle method", as there is little or no broad in the hive, so all varroa will be phoretic, and vulnerable to oxalic acid. Oxalic acid treatment is particularly important if you've used Apistan or Bayvarol in the hive previously; it is simple and doesn't bother the bees at this time of year ,but you do need to get the formulation right and it doesn't keep once mixed.



Some of the groups have already met to apply OA (by both trickle and evaporation methods), but given the mild weather we've had throughout December, it wouldn't be a surprise if some colonies still have brood. You will have to judge whether your colony is in a quiescent state, particularly if you keep your bees in a heavily insulated box.

Preparation for BBKA modules

We've got quite a group of people who have

passed their first level Husbandry certificate – but the step to the next practical assessment (general husbandry) is quite a large one. One way to bridge the gap is to study for BBKA module examinations. The areas of study are:

Module 1 - Honey bee Management

Module 2 - Honey bee Products and Forage

Module 3 - Honey bee Pests, Diseases and Poisoning

Module 5 - Honey bee Biology

Module 6 - Honey bee Behaviour

Module 7 - Selection & Breeding of Honey bees

Module 8 - Honey bee Management, Health and History

If you are interested to know more, or perhaps are thinking of studying for a module, please contact Julian or Adrian. You'll need to submit applications to sit the examination to Angela Merritt of KBKA by 5th February, to ensure she gets you registered. The actual examination(s) will be on 21st March. If you are interested in doing the Basic Certificate in apiculture, we'll arrange that with KBKA in the Spring; if you are considering the General Husbandry or Advanced Husbandry assessments, applications need to be with Angela by 22nd February.

For those of you who don't want to sit examinations, the BBKA have recently introduced the ARK – Apiarists' Record of Knowledge, which covers the same study material, but is done at a pace that suits you, and involves no written tests. More about this on page 5.

BBKA APIARISTS' RECORD OF KNOWLEDGE

The Apiarists Record of Knowledge (ARK) is an aid to help support and develop training within the BBKA membership.

ARK allows you to track your own progress through the BBKA's recommended curriculum in a similar way to a checklist, but being an electronic checklist ARK can also help you access relevant resources such as training courses/events, documents, videos and recommended reading. This ought to make ARK a valuable tool for all beekeepers, whether or not they wish to participate in formal evaluation schemes (such as the module examinations).



Beekeeping is predominantly a practical activity and competency is gained by working with honey bees, observing their activities, understanding their objectives and intervening where required. ARK is not an alternative route and cannot replace that experience. It is intended to provide a convenient record of the knowledge you will need when working with bees and should help you increase your understanding of what is known.

The individual competencies, or elements, have been grouped in the checklist into 7 subject areas and within each subject they are arranged by topic. Each competency has also been given a rating of difficulty, denoted by 1, 2 or 3 stars to help you approach the topics and subjects in an appropriate order.

The checklist allows you to record your progress at the level of each element. To do so open the element and in the current competency area select the appropriate level that you feel you have reached. The choices are Researched, Tried, Mastered or Verified. The latter is intended for you to show you have been formally assessed on this skill, probably as part of one of the BBKA Assessments or Modules.

The elements can have resources linked to them to help your understanding. It is planned that the resource list will be maintained and updated as ARK develops.

ARK has been created to support a range of devices including laptops, smart phones and tablets using standard browsers such as Google Chrome. The 'Help' buttons on each page will lead you through the features available.

On first visit please use the 'Signin' button at the top left. You will need your BBKA website Members Area login and password and you will need to have a valid email address in your BBKA Members profile. You will be asked to create your own password for ARK. On subsequent visits you can log directly in to ARK using 'Login' at the top right of the screen using this password.

Why not take a moment to set up your profile in ARK so you can receive the most relevant information, then explore the checklist elements that match your level of experience.
