A Happy New Year to all of you! Winter is finally upon us with frosts over the holiday period, and snow forecast at the end of this week. Ideally you will already have treated your bees with oxalic acid (Api-Bioxal or Oxuvar), to get the varroa numbers down.

If you are registered on BeeBase (the NBU

website), then you will have already received a warning about the possibility of colonies making higher-thanaverage use of food stores due to the un-seasonally warm weather. It would be advisable that you check your colonies and add supplements if required. Fondant is the best option at

this time of year, not liquid feed. In my apiaries, most colonies have used about 3kg of stores through November and December, which is comparable with previous years.

As you will see from the highlight box, we are lucky to have Lars Chittka come to speak with us on 18<sup>th</sup> January about the work he and his

team do to understand bumblebee behaviour and health. It promises to be a very interesting evening, so make sure to reserve it in your diaries!

Wintertime is a great time to learn more about beekeeping theory, ready for practice in the Spring.

Pp4,5,7,8 give details of upcoming courses. For those of you who are interested in the formal BBKA examinations and assessments, remember that signed applications have to be submitted via the KBKA exams secretary, Sharon Bassey, by 10th February.

#### Queen Rearing

Having established a working apiary in Bekesbourne in 2016, our 2017 aims include extending the operation to undertake some small-scale queen rearing. We want to encourage people to keep *nice* bees, and to be prepared to quickly exchange bad queens for queens whose colonies behave better. We are lucky that we have also got access to funds from KBKA, as well as a windfall from the National Grid, which will help us setup for this endeavour. Rudy Repka is a retired engineer, born in Czechia (Czech Republic). Rudy came to the UK in 1969, after the Russian invasion. Having briskly redone his engineering degree, for a number of years he was teaching various engineering courses at the South Bank Poly, in Southwark and in Lewisham. Later, he moved to the private sector and until his retirement, enjoyed working for the Daily Telegraph and the Financial Times.

Bees became his great hobby over 25 years ago. Within a few years he was passing the modules exams and was selectively rearing 80-120 queens from his best, locally adapted, London mongrel bees.

When he started with bees, he never realised they would open so many windows to such an interesting world and open doors to so many interesting and often remote parts of the globe, making many good friends. Curious to see other, non European bees, and how others run their bees, with Lydia, his wife, he have been very fortunate to have been invited to quite a number of places to offer and share his knowledge and experiences.

#### **BBKA NEWS**

The 57th Annual Delegate Meeting (ADM) of the BBKA will be held at 10.30am on Saturday 14th January 2017 at The National Beekeeping Centre, Stoneleigh Park, Kenilworth, Warks., CV8 2LG

Canterbury Beekeepers are represented at this meeting by the KBKA ADM delegate, John Hendrie, who is a member of the Sevenoaks and Tunbridge Wells branch of KBKA, and also this year's BBKA President.

There's way too much material covered at the ADM to summarise succinctly in this newsletter, so I will simply point you at the relevant pages of the BBKA website, where you can download all of the relevant papers, including financial statements, association propositions, and nominations for various BBKA roles.

For those of you who are new to the complexities of the running of BBKA, it is perhaps worth re-iterating that Canterbury Beekeepers is a branch of Kent Beekeepers Association. KBKA is the area association that is a member of BBKA. Each KBKA branch has two members of KBKA council, who become directors of KBKA (a limited company); currently Michael Roberts and David Cockburn represent our views at KBKA.

Discussion of the business that will take place at the Annual Delegate Meeting (ADM) of the BBKA begins back in the summer, and you can see KBKA Council's deliberations on this in the minutes on KBKA's website. There are a couple of important events that KBKA orchestrate, in addition to acting as the conduit between local branches and the BBKA. In the summer, KBKA hosts the Bee Tent and Honey Show as part of the Kent County Show at Detling, and usually in the late autumn, KBKA organises education talks ("the Lenham Lectures"), given in November 2016 by David Goulson and Phil Stevenson.

# BEEKEEPERS @ KSRC Courses in Winter 2016/7



Through the winter, Beekeepers at KSRC will repeat its very successful "Improver Key Skills" course. It's a five session course as follows:

The five sessions can be booked together for £25 (non-refundable). Topics that will be covered:

- Bee & colony life-cycles, reading the colony, translating that into management actions
- Swarm control an in-depth understanding of natural swarming, and its prevention
- Managing varroa the key to healthy bees; monitoring and treatments, inc. non-chemical.
- winter management
- Health and Hygiene

The course starts this week, and will run over 5 evenings from 10 January – 7<sup>th</sup> February. This local course will be at The BeeBarn - the training centre that is part of Bee Equipment's facilities at Highland Court Farm in Bridge, near Canterbury. It has a modern, well-equipped meeting/lecture room, with room for 35 delegates.

All these sessions are not intended for novices; our target audience is definitely "Improvers" - those who have kept bees for a season or two and are keen to learn more, to improve their understanding and management of their bees.
