## EDITOR'S NOTES

November is very much the quiet part of the year for beekeepers – time to bask in the glory of successes at Honey Shows, luxuriate in the quality of the honey you produced, and enjoy the warm glow of a candle produced entirely from the wax of your own beehives.

I'm pleased to report that a frame of honey from our Bekesbourne apiary won third prize in the Dover Honey Show, although David Cockburn opined that it was indistinguishable from the frame that won first prize in the same category at the National Honey Show in Epsom. We should prove this next year!

The first week of November gave us the first hoar frosts of the autumn, but otherwise October has been mild, and the bees have been active, at least if my hives are representative of the area. I did open one hive last weekend, to find four frames with brood, which was

heartening, as the key to successful overwintering, in addition to substantial honey stores, is a healthy population of winter bees. As Jürgen Tautz described in this month's *BBKA News*, bees raised at slightly lower nest temperatures will have the characteristics of winter bees – lifespans of 4-6 months, and high fat body content

enabling them to remain useful members of a colony through to April when brood-rearing accelerates in response to nectar flows and high light levels.

A surprise at the end of October was the number of wasps that are still being a nuisance in one of my apiaries.

They are only

interested in robbing honey stores, but with colonies in temperature-protective clusters, it can be easy for the wasps to enter colonies.

Frosts should see off the wasps, and supplementary feeding with fondant should correct any problems.

## CHRISTMAS PARTY

We have organised a party for Canterbury beekeepers at St Mary's Hall in Upper Harbledown on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December at 7pm. Beekeepers, friends and partners are all welcome: we'll be charging £10/head to cover food and hall hire. We are still finalising the details, but it will be a three course meal, with options for both vegetarians and omnivores. Magdalene Mei Halkes has kindly offered to organise the catering for us, so the price will be substantially less than what we might pay at a commercial location. Here's an approximate idea of the menu, which will expand or contract, dependent on the numbers attending:

### Cold:

tomatoes / mozzarella cheese platter  
Mixed green salad leaves  
Boiled Gammon  
Grilled Veggies.(pepper/courgettes) salad

### Hot:

Roast Duck Chinese style  
Chicken Satay sticks  
Grilled prawns  
Mixed vegetables stew /curry

### Puddings:

Carrot cake/Fruit cake  
Apple flan/Lemon drizzle cake  
Fruit crumble

## DIRECTIONS

St Mary's Hall, Roman Road, Upper Harbledown, Canterbury CT2 9AT

Coming out of Canterbury on the A2050, pass through the traffic lights at Palmars Cross Hill, and look out for a right turn onto Roman Road, about 200m past the lights. Try not to miss it, you will end up on the A2, and have to go up to Dunkirk! Follow Roman Road for about 600m through Upper Harbledown. There is a left turn signed to "Boughton, Faversham, A2": the hall is on the right hand side at this junction. Parking is on the street – please be considerate of the neighbours and park beyond the "access to London Road" sign.

## BRANCH NEWS



### AGM

This year's AGM on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November was a sparsely attended affair, but we were still able to conduct the necessary business, to elect branch officers for 2017, review the financial situation of the branch, and receive reports from the branch officers for 2016. You will receive draft minutes of the AGM in a few days' time. Given that relatively few people were able to attend (and so missed out on Simon and Jan's excellent B-themed quiz), we will undertake a brief member survey to get a better picture of what went well in 2016, and on what we should focus our limited resources in 2017.

### Apiary Manager

We are very grateful to Martin Neame for his work to support our first full year of running a branch apiary in Bekesbourne. He's done a great job of establishing the operating principles for the apiary, and successfully recruited a good cross-section of the branch membership to help out in managing the bees through the season. Martin's growing business interests prevent him from committing to this role in 2017, so we are looking for someone to help us out by managing the overall inspection and housekeeping activities – i.e. to organize branch members into a sensible roster. Martin is more than willing to provide guidance to anyone who is interested to step up, so please contact either the secretary ([Adrian](#)) or [Martin](#) to express interest. Beekeeping (in)experience is not a requirement for the role, just a good feel for organizing people.

### Committee

There are limited changes to the committee for 2017 – your Chairperson, Treasurer and Secretary have been re-elected – David Cockburn, Joan McAllister and Adrian Davis, and the other members of the committee are happy to continue to support the branch. We haven't re-appointed a membership secretary, in part because the

electronic forms for membership renewal and application are proving to reduce the amount of administration required to run the branch.

### Membership Subscriptions

These become due on 1st October for all members and friends of the branch. Our new electronic renewal system this year seems to be working fine, as 42 members (~67%) have already renewed. We'd be delighted if those remaining outstanding would renew their membership using the online form at:

Courses in Winter 2016/7

# Beekeepers @ KSRC



Through the winter, Beekeepers at KSRC will repeat its very successful "Improver Key Skills" course. It's a five session course as follows:

The five sessions can be booked together for £25 (non-refundable). Topics that will be covered:

- Bee & colony life-cycles, reading the colony, translating that into management actions
- Swarm control – an in-depth understanding of natural swarming, and its prevention
- Managing varroa – the key to healthy bees; monitoring and treatments, inc. non-chemical.
- winter management
- Health and Hygiene

We plan to hold the course in East Kent from 10 January – 7<sup>th</sup> February. This local course will be at The BeeBarn - the training centre that is part of Bee Equipment's facilities at Highland Court Farm in Bridge, near Canterbury. It has a modern, well-equipped meeting/lecture room, with room for 35 delegates.

All these sessions are not intended for novices; our target audience is definitely "Improvers" - those who have kept bees for a season or two and are keen to learn more, to improve their understanding and management of their bees. ## GENERAL HUSBANDRY ASSESSMENT PREPARATION TRAINING

We are very pleased to announce that a successful bid to DEFRA under the Healthy Bees Plan will provide the funds for the local support to those who plan to take the General Husbandry assessment in the near future.

The training is running between January and April 2017, and will be facilitated by a team of 14 Master Beekeepers who are also General Husbandry assessors in the following areas of the country:

North West, North East, South Wales, South West, Midlands, East Anglia, South East and Yorkshire

The programme of 20 hours will cover both practical and theoretical aspects of the General Husbandry assessment, aiming to give the participants an understanding of what the assessment entails and what they need to do in order to be successful.

The candidates are required to have taken the Basic certificate and be registered on BeeBase.
