EDITOR'S NOTES

Sometimes you have to ride your luck in beekeeping. Having exhorted everyone to pay attention to their

hives, and watch out for swarming, I struggled to follow my own advice, and finally got around to inspecting my hives properly in May during the Bank Holiday weekend just past. I had, at least, put a nuc

box with old comb up in a tree as a bait hive, as I could do this in the near dark, unlike with a proper inspection. When I finally got around to inspecting on Sunday, I found that my strongest colony had completely filled its super with honey, and also had 6 nice swarm cells, all but one of which was uncapped. I hastily performed a standard artificial swarm manoeuvre, taking the sealed and unsealed brood away, and allowing the

flying bees to join the queen in a new box with foundation. One day longer, and I might have been rescuing those bees from my bait-hive in the

tree!



TURNING A NEW PAGE THIS SEASON

Magdalene Mei Halkes demonstrates the power to learn

I know my bees are stroppy but my two colonies survived through winter.

I checked on them end of April and took some photos of the weak colony, see below. I showed them to Jan at our Neighbourhood meeting and he quickly pointed out the bald brood on the frame and suspected sac brood. He also pointed out 'my queen' in the photo (see photo on the right; a test for you all to find the queen). He suggested I called Kay (Wreford, our seasonal bee inspector) for an inspection. The next day, I went back, found my queen and marked it. This was a significant moment as I have never been able to do it all by myself.



SPOT THE QUEEN!

I told Kay that one of my colony was very aggressive as I have been stung a few times this year. I had the intention of replacing my queen and lined up to get a frame of nice bees with a queen cell from Rowena the night before Kay came to inspect my bees. It turned out the bees are healthy. Kay showed me something very valuable. To deal with aggressive bees I have to use a lot of smoke. While she was inspecting the frames, I was smoking away at them, keeping them down. After the first round of inspection, Kay could not find my queen. She was so kind and offered to show me how to find the queen. She showed me the pairing method, see the second photo, taking two frames out, then putting frames in pairs with a gap in between, then leave them for half an hour. On return, check the frames pair by pair, and surely the queen will be found inside one of the pairs. Of course, on that day we did not have 30 mins, but still, my queen was found and I marked her!

Then came a eureka moment. I noticed there was no bees flying around! They were calm. I was all prepared to find my queen and replace her. I asked Kay what I should do? She said, 'It's up to you!' Kay really showed me that I can have a chance to be calm with my bees. I closed my hive with my queen in it

and told Rowena the next day that I no longer need her queen cell.

I went back for an inspection 12 days later, well prepared with my smoker. I smoked under the cover board before I removed it to announce my arrival. I smoked every time I removed something on the top. I kept smoking every time I took a frame out. It really worked. This is the first time ever I truly enjoyed my bee inspection. I am so thrilled that I kept my loyal Queen! Kay suggested I feed the weak colony and it is increasing in numbers steadily.

I thought it is a good idea to share my good news with all. Thank you so much for all the support from our club.

Report for Canterbury Beekeepers of council meeting on 19 May 2018

Notes prepared by David Cockburn

These notes outline items of interest to me from the KBKA council meeting of 19 May, the full minutes should be reviewed for more completeness and detail.

2. Chris from Yalding objected to the minutes from the last meeting as he felt they didn't fully represent the discussion but they passed anyway.

- 4. Finance. With the resignation of our treasurer and failure so far to find an alternate, John Hendrie has been reviewing our current financial situation. He states that we are solvent and in a cash position to pay our bills. Anomalies have been found however and it was agreed that John Hendrie would talk to James Cash and they would look for an independent accountant up to £1500 to prepare accounts for the June deadline with retrospective approval from the council.

 5. BeeCraft survey. 150 voted to keep, 120 to
- remove with 53 votes rejected mostly because they were not registered members. If all votes were counted it would be 167 vs 155 to remove. After acrimonious discussion it was agreed to maintain the status quo but review before year end.

6 and 7. Subscription for 2018/9. It was agreed to remove the £3.50 members' subsidy as that is in contravention to our articles. However, this would have the effect of transferring money from the local level to the county level whereas our aim should be the opposite. It was agreed to set the sub for next year at £50 up from £46. There are at present at least 8 categories of membership to choose from, it was decided to task the executive with reducing this to 3 tiers and then distributing the sub equitably between them. Final decisions to be taken at the next committee meeting in September. Despite GDPR it was decided to retain addresses on the membership forms. BeeCraft is now £35 for a basic sub without discounts.

10. ByeLaws to be reviewed in September 11. County Show. 6-7-8 July. There will no longer be a live Bee demo for H&S reasons due to the change in location bringing it closer to the campsite. There will however be an observation hive.

Lenham Lecture 29 Sept. There will be two lectures one from someone from a West Country club speaking on the Asian Hornet.

Exams. Janet MacDonald, one of our branch, has passed her BBKA module. WELL DONE!! It was agreed to refund exam fees on passing.

GDPR. It is advised that treasurers use Dropbox and MailChimp to send emails and that membership records be kept for no more than 3 years after a member decides to leave. Next meeting 22 Sept.

Your attendance will be confirmed by the supply of entry tickets and duty rotas and these should reach you during the first week in July. The rota may well change between when I send it out and the Show itself, but if I have changed you to a different time I will let you know in advance. I aim to keep husbands, wives, partners and friends on the same time rota so they can enjoy their free time together. You are expected to do ONE half day slot during the day and you will then have half a day to wander round the show.

George Brown our Fundraising Manager, told the committee that Joules has donated £25K from the sale of wellingtons with the honey bee design. I do have a pair of these and have enjoyed using them. Let's hope that they keep on manufacturing them and continue to support the BBKA.

Communications

Simon Cavil has been very busy with his own business and the IMYB project and has resigned from Chair of the Communications Committee. Thankfully, we have another Trustee who is up to speed on the internet etc., and Dianne Drinkwater has agreed to take on the task. I hope you join us in wishing her well, it is quite a busy role but I am sure that she will be an excellent choice.

Special Editions

Special Editions, again these are very popular and the next project will be 'Honey' from the comb to the end product in a jar, or even ready for presentation for a show. I think these books are great, they are specific and you can get to the information you want easily and their cost is minimal; a great way to learn and keep up to date.

We are also looking to create a laminated sheet to assist with queen rearing, showing timings etc. Again, a must for the novice rearing queens but also essential for its timings, even for experienced beekeepers. We are also looking at publishing another booklet on 'Queen Rearing' itself, but everything takes time, after all Rome was not built in a day!



This is all part of the desire to set up queen breeding in regions, we have had some interest, so to those who have contacted us, we are still trying to set out plans to make this all happen.

Editorial

I would like to say a personal 'thank you' to all those people who are members of the BBKA and who have given their time, expertise, photographs, editing skills, writing skills and general knowledge to create these booklets. Not one single person has asked for payment for the contributions, this is the only reason we are able to offer these to you at such low prices.

I would like to suggest that each Branch of an Association buys at least one book of each set. These can then be viewed by their members who would be able to judge which ones they would like to have on their own apiary bookshelf. The General Husbandry and Advanced Husbandry books are a must. If you are thinking of taking these assessments, they certainly got me through at my first attempt.

Banks, Interest payable

We have told you in the BBKA News and also in last month's letter that we have changed banks to Santander who pay 0.5% interest on our current account. If you are holding funds in your own branch/association, it may be worth your while investigating what your local Santander can offer to you. I have just changed my personal account to get the same deal for myself.

Committee meetings

At the last weekend, we had a busy time. On the Friday we started early with Finance, Governance, Research and then Education and Husbandry. Those meetings only ended at 8pm after an early start. On the Saturday we had the Exec meeting all morning breaking only to spend time with the family of James Hopkins who had kindly willed a legacy to the BBKA. They are a lovely family and were so pleased to see the tree dedicated in his honour in the apiary. The tree is a *Koelruteria paniculata*, or a Golden Rain Tree using its common name, (much easier to say and spell). They were excited with our plans for the apiary and the schools project, we just have to get it all going, but within budgets of course. We had a photographer video recording the event, we are hoping to have this available on its completion.

We then returned to the EC meeting, which finished just before 4pm.

Downstairs there was still a training course going on for GH assessors, so another full day. On the Sunday there were two training courses, using the apiary and the hall at Stoneleigh, some of the Trustees were involved with this and that again took another day, some of whom were training and some being trained.

Shows

On Monday we had the Shows Committee meeting, discussing Chatsworth and what we needed to do to get all the gear there. I only joined the Shows Committee half way



through last year and I am astounded by the dedication and the efforts that all members of this team give to the BBKA. The First show of the year is at Chatsworth and the design had to be completed, the new entrance stand (much lighter to lift) is what we would offer to the public, what have we got for the children, especially as there were going to be several schools attending. Where are the volunteers going to stay, had we all been passed by RHS as attendee's for how many people were needed on each day, how many



volunteers from the BBKA would there be, the list goes on and on. I will be there, as will Stephen Barnes and Suzanne Bennett, we were all added to the list of volunteers, our days available are recorded and a rota developed to cover the show on all days. Before the public get there and after they leave, all the equipment has to be dismantled and stored for transport to and from Stoneleigh, none of those who are on this committee charge anything for their time, they willingly contribute this to the BBKA and I think they deserve a round of applause from every member. However, if you want to see this dedicated team then come along to the RHS show at Chatsworth, you will enjoy the day as well as seeing those people who toil away for your benefit. They are the ones telling the public how much support the honey bees need in order to survive and tell them how important plants are for pollinators.

Past Promise now made good

Some members may remember that Rowse Honey made a donation to the BBKA on condition that videos were produced about honey bees, this was all before my time but has been the subject of discussion over the past couple of years. We are now in the final stages of producing one of the videos. It takes an hour to view it and hopefully we will have it ready for the National Honey Show in October. Out thanks to Ken Basterfield for organising this, it is certainly long overdue.

Staff welfare

You may recall that Sue Webster, a valued Trustee, resigned in January as a result of the lack of support at the ADM for the office staff at Stoneleigh regarding bullying. The office staff also get abuse from some members of the BBKA when they receive phone calls in the office. This cannot and will not be tolerated. In order to counter this behaviour, we are having installed a voice recording system on all the telephone lines so that if this should happen, we have proof of the aggressive conversation and will be able to deal with it effectively. It is sad that we have to do this. We have over 27,000 members and 99.99% of those are lovely, but it only takes one to cause upset and the staff should not have to tolerate it.

Research

I have mentioned in my Chairman's letter about 'Posh Bee' and the delays incurred whilst registering for it. Pam Hunter, Chair of Research, after much persistence has now been able to complete all the details that the EU require. This has taken several weeks; however, it has been confirmed we are 38 out of 42 applicants and that we may be in line for 35K euros to give us an even bigger research fund. If we get this, I think Pam deserves a big vote of thanks and a very large G & T!

I am told that to have a document that is too long is not a good thing, so I am going to leave it for now and the other news will be in the issue for July.

Enjoy the weather, this may be all we will get for our summer.
